With shopping almost better than New York's, and food to rival Paris, Hong Kong is fast becoming a fabulous long-weekend destination. The hotel scene is firing off in all directions – endless Mandarin Orientals, Four Seasons and Peninsulas all battling it out to be top dog. But if you are feeling super-swanky – and are fond of a thumping bassline – then the InterContinental's Presidential Suite is as fly as you can get. The hotel is right on the Kowloon waterfront, so even the recently renovated harbour-view rooms have arguably the best cityscape panoramas in the world. The Presidential Suite, however, is a suite on steroids. To party here – floating about in the rooftop infinity pool overlooking Hong Kong Island and Victoria Harbour, rocking around the huge wraparound terrace, dipping in the inside/outside Jacuzzi and then hitting Lan Kwai Fong in the Rolls-Royce ascribed to your room – is the best plan by far. The Observatory Hotel

First things first. The Observatory Hotel doesn't have views of the Sydney

Opera House. It is far too poised, cosy and grown-up for such things. Located in the Rocks district – the oldest part of Sydney, beyond the main harbour – it is a world of graceful comfort and maxed-out chintz. Drink lapsang souchong and the staff will remember for next time. The huge indoor pool is unbeatable and the Japanese-French food is impressive. Some rooms have balconies for afternoon siestas in the western sunshine.
