DESCRIPTION

Named among "The World's Best Places to Stay" in *Condé Nast Traveler* magazine's Gold List Awards and chosen by *Departure Magazine* readers as one of the Top 25 Boutique Hotels in the US and Canada, Keswick Hall's Italianate architecture, pastoral green setting, refined ambiance, and elegant décor are reflective of 19th century American affluence. Keswick Hall offers a host of modern conveniences, including exquisite accommodations, award-winning cuisine, a range of recreational activities, and warm, personal service.

The 600-acre Keswick Estate provides the ideal setting for Keswick Hall and its Club, an exhilarative golf and pampering facility, offering an indoor/outdoor pool and Jacuzzi, fitness & exercise center, a full complement of massage and beauty treatments, an informal dining room, lounge and bar, and an 18-hole Arnold Palmer designed signature golf course.

LOCATION

This Tuscan-style villa is in the heart of Virginia hunt country, bordering the Blue Ridge Mountains in historic Charlottesville, the University of Virginia, Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, and a variety of award-winning wineries. Located amid the center of the area Mr. Jefferson described as "The Eden of the United States," Keswick Hall at Monticello is just six miles east of Charlottesville and five miles from Monticello.

Keswick Hall proudly rests on 600-acres of lush Virginia countryside known as Keswick Estate. The 48-room Keswick Hall is a luxury inn which also hosts the private Keswick Club featuring an 18-hole, 6,507-yard Arnold Palmer signature golf course, three pools (an infinity edge lounging pool on the piazza level of the hotel, an indoor/outdoor pool at the club house, and an Olympic-size lap pool at the tennis center), a fitness center complete with spa, pro shop, tennis complex and dining facilities. The property also includes approximately 126 planned (minimum one-acre) home sites, aptly named Keswick Estate.

ACCESS

Delta, United Express, US Airways, Colgan Air and Continental serve the Charlottesville Albemarle Airport. Piedmont Aviation Service, adjacent to this facility, is available for private planes and jets. The property also features a private helipad. By car, Keswick Hall at Monticello is only 1 hour from Richmond, 1.5 hours from Washington and 2.5 hours from Baltimore.

GUESTROOMS

No two of Keswick Hall's 48 guest rooms are alike. Each is subtly themed (aviation, fishing, maps, the circus, tennis and music) and feature antiques, plush furnishing, linen and fabrics featuring heirloom patterns. Facing formal gardens at the front and the golf course and lush rolling fields at the back, many rooms feature canopied four-poster beds plumped with comforters and feather pillows, bergere club chairs, personal collectibles, hand-painted armoires, overstuffed ottomans, antique furnishings and fitted carpets with Aubusson designs.

Generously sized bathrooms feature separate, glass-enclosed showers, oversized or claw-footed tubs, antique porcelain bathroom sets, heated towel racks, hair-dryers, and a selection of bath amenities, including herbal bath salts, hair treatments, body lotions, cotton swabs and shower caps.

Nightly turndown service features sumptuous butter cookies served on antique china.

PUBLIC ROOMS

In keeping with the grandest and most authentic elegant estates, public rooms at Keswick Hall serve different purposes. The Crawford Lounge, formerly the entrance hall for Villa Crawford, is an ideal setting for cocktails or afternoon tea. The Morning Room, the cozy Villa Crawford and the Snooker Room are places where guests can enjoy afternoon tea, a midnight game and glass or two of port or sherry before turning in. The library with its roaring fire now houses over 400 books by Virginians or about Virginia. Furnishings in these rooms are a blend of original antiques and period inspired pieces.

Overstuffed furniture with fringes and tassels, assorted antiques, cherished paintings, sculptures, and tables stacked with art books and rare editions offer travelers a welcome respite from their hectic lives. Blazing fires in warm hearths, porcelain bowls of granny smiths, silver dishes of nuts atop heirloom buffets, and decanters gleaming with colorful liqueurs complete the warm and inviting setting.

DINING

Fossett's – Opened in June of 2004, Keswick Hall's elegant yet casual evening restaurant features expansive three-sided floor to ceiling windows with spectacular open views of the estate's pristine landscape and the Southwest mountains. The interiors, designed to be warm and refreshing, are accented with historical Virginia artwork, custom designed furniture, and original hand-painted murals. During the mild weather months, Fossett's will also offer al fresco terrace seating overlooking the rolling fairways of the estate's Arnold Palmer signature golf course. The restaurant and staff offer a culinary experience that is approachable, contemporary, and innovative.

Fossett's is named in honor of Thomas Jefferson's chief cook at Monticello, Edith Fossett (1787-1854). Mrs. Fossett held one of the most responsible positions in Jefferson's household during his retirement years. Mrs. Fossett learned the art of French cooking from Honore Julien, Head Chef, and Etienne Lemaire, the maitre de hotel, while serving in the White House during Jefferson's presidential years. The restaurant is open seven days a week for lunch and is closed for dinner on Tuesdays. Breakfast is served from 7:30 a. m. to 10 a.m. on weekdays and 7:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. Brunch is served on Sunday from 11 a.m to 2 p.m. and dinner is served from 6 p.m. – 9:30 p.m., six days a week. Reservations and smart casual attire are recommended for dinner.

Fossett's Bar – Located adjacent to the restaurant, the bar features specialty and signature drinks such as the Cucumber Rickey, East Gate Blood Orange Martini and Fairway Ginger Tonic. Fossett's Bar features an exquisite U-bar, terrace and fireside seating, and live music and is open 5 pm – 11 pm daily, with food served until 9:30 p.m.

The Palmer Room – Located only steps from Keswick Hall, The Palmer Room at Keswick Club offers casual dining for guests of the Inn and club members. With seating for 50, it provides a cozy setting with expansive views of the golf course for lunch and dinner. Entrees showcase local products, seafood and Asian inspired cuisine including Local Hubbard Squash Bisque, Asian Chopped Salad, Tequila – Lime – Shiso Chicken and Jumbo Lump Crab Cakes "Delmarva". The Palmer Room is open daily for lunch from 11:30 am – 3:00 pm and on Sundays the lunch menu is available until 8:00 pm. Dinner is served Tuesday through Saturday from 5:30 pm – 9:00 pm with a full dinner menu available. On Mondays, from 3:00 pm – 5:00 pm the Palmer Room Bar offers beverage service.

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KESWICK HALL AT MONTICELLO

History

In 1769, Thomas Jefferson built Monticello amid the mountain ridges, rolling hills and open meadows of Virginia, which he once referred to as “The Eden of the United States.” Since then, the area’s beauty, history and landscape, favored among the horse and wine set, has drawn visitors and new residents. Overlooking this mountain-rich countryside Keswick Hall at Monticello is located just six miles east of Charlottesville and five miles from Monticello.

Beginning in the 19th century, the Keswick Hall property was in the hands of John Rogers of Keswick Farm. There he built Broad Oak, a one-story house that took its name from the abnormally large oak tree located in front of the building. In 1861, Broad Oak was purchased at auction by Edward C. Mead, who expanded the house by adding a second story. The house, which was included in the Meade’s 1898 book of “Historic Homes of the South-West Mountain Virginia,” was tragically demolished by fire shortly after the turn of the twentieth century.

The vacant plot of land then captured the eye of a University of Virginia student named Robert B. Crawford, who purchased the property with his wife in 1912. Not surprisingly, Villa Crawford spawned from a delightfully romantic story. During a weekend when male students moved out of the University dorms to make room for female guests, Crawford remained at the boarding house where he lived to tend the furnace. Crawford overheard a young woman being criticized by her roommate and he stepped in to defend her. His noble gesture won the affections of the embattled woman and the two were soon married. Fortunately for Mr. Crawford, the woman turned out to be Miss Daingerfield, a very wealthy mid-western heiress. It was the newlywed’s long honeymoon in Italy that inspired them to purchase the 300 acres in Keswick and build their own Italianate-style mansion. Crawford hired architect Eugene Bradbury to construct what would become Villa Crawford, the building that serves as the core of today’s Keswick Hall at Monticello, included room number nine that was the original master bedroom of the Crawfords. The Villa, constructed for \$100,000, was a two-story, stucco-clad dwelling with a tile roof. A photo of the original dwelling is available on the UVA Holsinger Collection website, accessed through the Special Collections library.

A prominent local architect, Eugene Bradbury began his career in Washington, DC, but moved to Charlottesville in 1907 to start his own architectural practice. Bradbury’s designs are associated with the architectural movement referred to as the Second General Renaissance, a style that catered to American clients who favored designs based on Renaissance Europe. The eclectic designs included buildings inspired by Italian palazzos, Georgian estates, and French chateaux.

Of the 37 known buildings designed by Bradbury in the Charlottesville vicinity, the majority fit this mold. Impressively, he is lauded for his balance of sensitivity toward Charlottesville’s rich architectural history and his clients’ individual wishes. Some of Bradbury’s other designs include the 1916 renovations of the Deunlora House, St. Paul’s Memorial Church on University Avenue, and the University of Virginia entrance building, which now houses the UVA Women’s Center.

The Crawfords, who soon had twin sons, enjoyed living in their Italian-inspired Keswick mansion. However, tragedy soon struck when Robert Crawford died suddenly at an early age. Officially recorded as dying in Baltimore in 1919, interestingly, Baltimore is not the only recorded location of his death. A local legend, reported in a 1978 newspaper article, counterclaims that Mr. Crawford instead disappeared mysteriously while walking the grounds of Villa Crawford. While the story behind the legend is unknown, Mr. Crawford has been implicated in some unusual events that have taken place on property since his death. Mrs. Crawford remarried shortly after husband's death and her beloved Villa Crawford was sold. The property remained in private hands for the next 35 years and retained the name of Villa Crawford.

In 1947 the extensive flower gardens of this private residence were traded for putting greens and fairways. The initial development was headed by a group of Albemarle businessmen who purchased the property from the estate of August Heid. Calling themselves "The Keswick Corporation", they were formed with the exclusive purpose of developing the property into a country club. In order to achieve their goal, they converted the large private residence into a clubhouse, added a golf course, and installed a steel oval pool. Their entrepreneurial endeavors proved profitable during the 1950s and the club membership rose to nearly 300. During these years, the club hosted numerous formal balls and dinners, becoming a central fixture in Keswick's social life. However, in 1960 profits began to wane, and in 1965 the club was sold at auction for \$150,000. The sale price particularly shocking when considering that *The Daily Progress* reported that the clubhouse alone was worth \$1million at that time.

Happily, the club was revitalized after the sale by its new owner Knox Turnbull, who also served as the president of the newly formed Keswick Estates Inc. Turnbull's ambitious vision resulted in a large addition to the clubhouse in 1966, an ice rink in 1967, up to 10 tennis courts including the first covered courts south of Washington D.C., as well as the installation of a towrope on the driving range for ski practice. Although these improvements were financially burdensome, membership flourished and soon reached close to 700. The golf course was particularly successful and Keswick hosted the State Open in both 1969 and 1970. Unfortunately, the club's prosperity floundered with the death of Turnbull in 1971. Turnbull's estate tried to sell the club to the Board of Directors of Keswick Estates, but they were unable to raise the required capital. The club officially folded in August of 1972, although the golf course remained in operations as a public course for the next eight years.

A winemaker would be the next person who would be charmed by the Villa. Mr. J.W. (Bill) Lane of Fairfax, the owner of Pied Mont Vineyards Company acquired the property with plans to renovate the Villa Crawford the center-point of a series of lush vineyards reminiscent of the French Countryside. To help make his dream a reality, he hired David Rosenthal of Northern Virginian to make some cosmetic changes to the clubhouse so it would inspire a Chateau-esque ambiance. His scheme received criticism from those who preferred Bradbury's design. Subsequently, Lane's plans never materialized and the club sold in 1981 for \$1 million to William H. Burress, president of the Burress Land and Lumber Company of Lynchburg.

Burress hoped to rekindle the Villa's earlier success a private country club. However, his reign was short lived for the club suddenly closed its doors during the summer of 1983 just two years after his purchase. Thomas Curtis a develop form Houston, and George O' Brien, a golf pro from New Jersey, reportedly purchased the property from Burress for \$1.5 million. Together they planned to renovate the clubhouse and golf course, as well as create a residential development; however, they too ran into financial difficulties and sold the property 1989.

Despite a rocky past, Villa Crawford's charmed past managed to captivate Bob Paxton, an architect in Alexandria, who brought the property to the attention of Lord Bernard Ashley, widower of internationally-successful designer Laura Ashley. Paxton was familiar with Lord Ashley's original

American country-house hotel; The Inn at Perry Cabin located near St. Michael's, Maryland, as well as a similar property called Llangoed Hall in Wales, England. In both cases, Lord Ashley operated successfully renovated historic country estates. Heeding Paxton's advice, Lord Ashley purchased the property and 600 adjoining acres for \$5.5 million in 1990. Mr. Paxton, hired as the architect, expanded Villa Crawford into a grand hotel that recalled Bradbury's original Italian-inspired design. The new design was Palladian in plan, with a large central block flanked by symmetrical wings. Arnold Palmer's company was hired to renovate and expand the Findlay-designed golf course. Taking advantage of natural hazards offered by the property's ancient oaks, grassy wetlands and meandering creeks, it was Mr. Palmer who said, "These are the finest greens in Virginia - probably on the entire East Coast."

A residential development was also planned for the grounds. Ashley House, as the property was called after the renovations opened in 1993 with high praises. The 48-room hotel continued to thrive under Ashley's leadership until the stewardship was passed on the Orient-Express Hotels in 1999 for \$13.5 million.

It was the beauty of the region and Keswick Hall's appeal that beckoned to a time and tradition of landed gentry that caught the attention of Orient-Express Hotels, Trains & Cruises, a company whose commitment to the finest in travel is commemorated in their namesake property, the famed Venice Simplon-Orient-Express train. They acquired the property mid-1999 and set about refurbishing the guest rooms and public spaces in both the hotel and club house including new bathrooms, linens and soft goods and the restoration of the antiques, the addition of a new fine dining restaurant on the piazza level, a new 25 meter infinity edge pool, and the enhancement and lengthening of the private golf course as well as the introduction of a Fossett's restaurant.. In addition, the hotel introduced new service and amenities, including a butler style service (including specialized services of a baby butler), a Virginia library and customized area experiences ranging from wine tours to sporting clays on private estates.

Today, guests of Keswick Hall enjoy immediate access to the 18-hole Arnold Palmer-designed signature golf course and five lighted tennis courts, three pools and state-of-the-art fitness equipment. In keeping with the grandest and most authentic elegant estates, public rooms at Keswick Hall serve different purposes. The Crawford Lounge, formerly the entrance hall for Villa Crawford, is an ideal setting for cocktails or afternoon tea. The Villa Crawford is a place where guests can enjoy a midnight game and glass or two of port or sherry before turning in. The library with its roaring fire now houses over 1,000 books by Virginians or about Virginia. Furnishings in these rooms are a blend of original antiques and period inspired pieces.

Tidbits, Anecdotes and Fascinating Facts

- Each room in the hotel is individually decorated, no two are alike. The rooms feature subtle themes that capture a country squire lifestyle (e.g. fishing, hunting, art, etc.). Rooms are lavishly furnished with original antiques.
- A nod to the past, guest rooms do not feature closets but beautiful antique armoires, each is different and has been chosen to best complement the room.
- The inn features a private helipad for quick and easy access for guests. Used occasionally by select individuals, it has also been used to launch hot air balloons for guests wanting a birds-eye-view of the gorgeous country-side, especially during the fall when the leaves are turning.
- Surrounded by both formal and informal gardens, nearby neighbors include horse farms such as Belcort and Bridlespur. The Keswick Hunt Club is Virginia's oldest hunt club founded in 1889 and it annually hosts nationally attended jumping and dressage competitions.
- Keswick Hall features three pools: a 35-meter lap pool at the tennis centre, a 25 meter infinity edge pool that offers quiet relaxation and amazing views and an indoor/outdoor exercise pool at the club house.
- Keswick Hall features wood burning fireplaces in many of the public rooms. The largest fireplace is in the Great Hall. On Christmas morning, guests staying at the hotel can wander through the public rooms to discover which fireplace their personalized holiday stocking has been hung over.
- Room 33, 34 and 35 used to be in the attic of the original house. Today they feature large bathrooms with claw foot tubs and beautiful dormer windows that capture some of the best views of the sun rising over the fairways.
- Room number nine is the Louis XV inspired room, featuring the original hardwood floors that date back to 1912 and French doors that open onto a private terrace - the room offers breathtaking views of the golf course and infinity pool below. - Additional Celebrity guests include: Bill Murray, Tom Brokaw, Senator Joseph Lieberman, Katie Couric, Margaret Thatcher, David Farley, Mick Jagger, James Brown, Morgan Freeman and Arnold Palmer.
- Since its opening, the hotel has maintained a guest sign-in book, which has captured memories and compliments of thousands of guests over the last decade. “You slowed me down,” “my special place,” “the service surpasses the beautiful surroundings,” are only a few of the wonderful comments captured.
- Access to Keswick Club means more than just the use of their facilities – guests can be given a locker, and access to the services of the country club’s concierge who will arrange tee times, spa services, tennis lessons, private work-out sessions and even find a local member to play tennis or golf with.
- Homemade toffee, chocolate covered strawberries, chocolate truffles or petits fours are only a few of the options that the pastry chef creates for guests’ bedside snack. The turn down treats at Keswick are rarely repeated during a guests’ stay, but are always delicious.
- Wendy is a frisky and determined Border Collie who has a very important job at Keswick Hall. She is the official goose and duck re-locator. True to her inherent nature to herd, Wendy ensures her feathered friends are gently moved off the fairways and into the ponds and roughs, so that golfers have the right of way. Guests can enjoy watching Wendy hard at work from the piazza of the hotel.
- Charlottesville has long drawn visitors but has also become one of the number one places to live. Charlottesville has been named *Money* magazine's #1 Small City in the South and as the number one best place to live in the United States in 2004 by the book *Cities Ranked and Rated*, as well as being selected by *CNN Money*, *Modern Maturity* and the *Men’s Journal* in their annual best places to live survey.
- Special tours can be arranged by the concierge at the hotel, which include tours with the University of Virginia Architect, who specializes in the history of the building and the Academic Village.
- Located in the fifth largest wine producing state in the U.S., Keswick Hall at Monticello is a short drive to more than 25 vineyards where guests can enjoy tours and tastings. The hotel’s own restaurant celebrates wines’ significance to the region by ensuring a well stocked wine cellar of both Virginia and International wines. The Cellar currently boasts more than 650 labels, and the restaurant serves more than 20 wines by the glass.
- The hotel produces its own private label wines Edith’s Chardonnay and Edith’s Petit Verdot, which pays tribute to Edith Fossett, Thomas Jefferson’s chief cook at Monticello – one of the most responsible positions in Jefferson’s household during his retirement.
- One of the Monticello area vineyards even has a celebrity connection. Bleinheim Vineyards is owned by Dave Matthews, of the Dave Mathews Band. The Bleinheim vineyard is a biodynamic vineyard.
- Keswick Vineyards, nearby, houses its tasting room on the Keswick Hall property.
- Furnishings in the hotel and guest rooms are indicative of the history of the era including canopied four-poster beds, plump comforters and feather pillows, bergere club chairs, antique memorabilia, hand-painted armoires, ottomans, a combination of English and Early American antique furnishings and carpets with Aubusson designs. Signature heirloom pattern fabrics and wall coverings brighten

each room. Generously sized bathrooms feature separate, glass enclosed showers, oversized or claw-footed tubs, antique porcelain bathroom sets, heated towel racks, hair dryers, and a selection of pampering amenities including bath salts, hair treatments and hand and body creams.

Luxury weddings at Keswick Hall have included a number of unique touches per the bride's request, including: a custom-made hand painted dance floor, personal artwork and family photographs replacing the current collection on display at the property for the duration of the wedding, and more than 5,000 roses.
- In addition to the beautiful songs of 80 different birds species and the dance of fireflies in the evening - especially brilliant during the summer months of June, July and August – guests can also regularly spot whitetail deer, fox, migrating geese, rabbits and squirrels. In fact, Keswick Hall's private golf course is one of only nine Audubon certified courses in the state.
- Keswick Hall's Virginia library is housed on the main floor of the hotel and includes a collection of over 400 books by Virginians or about Virginia that cover a wide range of topics including history, memoirs, photography, cookbooks, nature, and fiction. Included in the collection are books by John Grisham and Rita Mae Brown who live nearby. Guests are welcome to enjoy the books in the library or in the comfort of their room.
 - Keswick Hall has a special fondness for babies – and their fatigued parents. The hotel provides parents with a list of sitters that ensures even our youngest guests receive the pampering attention they deserve. - Raindrop Therapy is one of the most popular treatments offered at the Keswick Hall spa. Raindrop Therapy is a combination oil application and technique used by the Lakota Indians. It is designed to bring the body into balance, help align the energy centers for the body and release blockages. Drops of essential oil fall like rain onto the back and after each one is applied, it is smoothed and fanned over the nerves. The oils used include: Cypress, Thyme, Oregano, Basil, Valor, Marjoram, Wintergreen and Aroma-Siez, but each is personalized to the individual client.
- The Blue Ridge Mountain range runs for approximately 577 miles and can be seen from the hotel. The top of the mountain range is a mere 20 mile drive from Charlottesville (20 minutes). The range got its' name from the conifers on the mountain which ooze a resin that reacts to the sunlight when it evaporates into the air creating a blue haze over the mountains.
- Dining at Keswick is always a special event, and one of the most popular offerings is the Signature Table, a private dinner table set by the Infinity Pool (May through October). Guests receive a

welcoming toast of champagne, a five-course meal selected by the guests from the Fossett's menu, and a server dedicated solely to their needs. Up to 8 guests per event.

- Continuing the grand tradition of local produce and “garden to table” eating as cultivated by Jefferson at Monticello, the hotel boasts its own “Chef’s Garden” which boasts an extensive supply of produce year-round served in the hotel’s own Fossett’s restaurant.
- Keswick is also the land of foxhunts, where ladies and gentleman covet a good hound and where every dog truly does have its day. As such, Keswick Hall welcomes dogs of every shape and size, whether they aspire to the hunt, or simply dream of spending every drowsing moment before a roaring fireplace. The pet program includes accommodations in select rooms with terrace access and an accompanying human companion, a special Pet Menu is served on unique “pet china,” and the Hall’s Butler Program extends to pets walks with a specially trained porter as well as special maps of local trails and other dog-friendly habitats around the area.
- Imagine an early morning stroll with a four legged friend taken to the extreme. At Keswick Hall guests can enjoy a walk with the hounds, with the hound master from the neighboring hunt club and over 50 of his wagging tailed charges around a 1 to 2 mile loop on the grounds of Keswick Estate. This off leash group of canines follow the hound master like an adoring fan club, but a guest need only pat one of these pups on the head to be surrounded by a poise of them who await their turn.
- The Chef’s cooking has even delighted iconic rockers – when Mick Jagger stayed at Keswick Hall he supped on Fossett’s signature Spinach and Goat Cheese Whipped Potatoes with Chesapeake Bay Rockfish.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, VIRGINIA

"The Eden of the United States"

Thomas Jefferson

The Commonwealth of Virginia is the setting where some of the most significant events in American history have taken place. From the first English settlers arriving on the banks of Jamestown almost four centuries ago, to the many battles that took place during the Civil War, historic sites and attractions abound.

So much of America's history unfolded here in the "Old Dominion," home to more American presidents and Civil War battles than any other state. Surrounded by lush green landscapes and an array of recreational options, Virginia is also known for its high standard of living. Here anyone can witness the past while enjoying all the benefits of a modern world. In fact, Charlottesville was recently named as *Money* magazine's #1 Small City in the South and as the number one best place to live in the United States in 2004 by the book *Cities Ranked and Rated*. The city has also been selected by *CNN Money*, *Modern Maturity* and the *Men's Journal* in their annual best places to live surveys.

Virginia's diversity can be experienced in the seven different regions that make up this Commonwealth: Northern Virginia, Shenandoah Valley, Southwest Blue Ridge Highlands, Central Virginia, Tidewater and Hampton Roads, Eastern Shore and Chesapeake Bay. Each region contains its own share of history.

Central Virginia is a blend of beautifully preserved heritage, modern facilities and attractions. A popular choice for both business and leisure travelers, guests find a graceful blend of old and new in the area's many cities. In the heart of the prime region is Richmond, the state's capital, with a stunning blend of past and present. From the Edgar Allan Poe Museum, housed in the colonial-era Old Stone House and historic Tredegar Iron Works and the lobby of Old City Hall, to the Japanese Tea House at the Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden, the city is not to be missed. Other "must sees" while in Richmond include the Valentine Museum, Virginia Historical Society and State Library of Virginia.

The area is also home to some of America's greatest patriots. Scotchtown, near Ashland, was the residence of the revolutionary Patrick Henry. Many of the founding fathers lived in this region, including Presidents Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and James Madison, and their homes are open to the public today.

Central Virginia also has many reminders of the Civil War, including the Museum and White House of the Confederacy in Richmond and Petersburg, which remained under military siege for more than nine months. Pamplin Historical Park, one of America's most exciting private historical attractions, allows visitors to experience the breakthrough of Union troops through the defenses commanded by General Robert E. Lee. Danville, the last capital of the Confederacy and Appomattox Court House, where General Lee surrendered to General Ulysses S. Grant, ending the most brutal war in our nation's history, are legendary.

The city of Charlottesville, the gem of the Central Virginia region, epitomizes the beauty of Virginia. Part of Albemarle County, it was formed in 1744 and named in honor of William Ann Keppel, second Earl of Albemarle, who was then governor general of the colony. Charlottesville, named for Queen Charlotte, wife of George III, was established as a town in 1762 and incorporated as a city in 1888. With a population of just over 45,000, Charlottesville is a backdrop of brilliant color and deep tradition.

From Montpelier's circa 1809 temple to its outrider's red jackets and racing silks, time stands still as thundering steeds run the steeplechase at the annual Montpelier Hunt Race. This popular weekend event takes place on the grounds at Montpelier, the Federal-style pink manse west of Charlottesville that once belonged to James Madison, framer of the Constitution, sponsor of the Bill of Rights, and fourth president of the United States.

Of course, the cornerstone of Charlottesville is Monticello, home of third President Thomas Jefferson, author, and founder of the University of Virginia. Designed by Jefferson beginning in 1768, the grounds of the house illustrate his architectural, scientific and agricultural genius. The main house is open to the public daily. A fascinating look into the great thinker's mind, the tour features Jefferson's personal treasures: his inventions, marble busts of those he respected and admired, and artifacts bestowed as gifts from explorers Lewis and Clarke, who in their expedition of the Louisiana Purchase, essentially crated the size and mass of the United States as it is known today.

Monticello is visited by more than 500,000 visitors from around the world annually, and is the only house designated by the United Nations as a World Heritage Site, along with the Great Wall of China and Stonehenge. The Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation is charged with protecting this international treasure and preserving the legacy of Monticello's past for future generations.

Today Monticello is renowned for its magnificent house and grounds, as well as its research efforts, restoration and educational programs, classroom curricula, and its annual Fourth of July event when dozens of immigrants to the U.S. take the Oath of Citizenship at Monticello.

For first timers to Charlottesville, a good way to see the area is to begin at the classically beautiful rotunda at the University of Virginia, Thomas Jefferson's tribute to "the illimitable freedom of the mind," which lends a stately grace to the city. The "father" of the University, Mr. Jefferson created this "Academical Village" which is still regarded as one of the nation's most outstanding universities and supreme architectural achievements. From this magical epicenter, Charlottesville unfolds encompassing historic monuments, bookstores, restaurants and bars, an excellent symphony and theatre Repertoire Company, and an annual film festival.

As America's first wine connoisseur, Thomas Jefferson believed that world-class wines could be produced in Virginia. In 1773 he gave his land adjoining Monticello to Italian winemaker Filippo Mazzei, to establish a European-style vineyard. Mazzei found the soil and climate of Virginia to be superior to that of Italy, and believed "some of the best wine in the world will be made here"

Today Jefferson's land produces award-winning Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay and Riesling under the Jefferson Vineyards label, and Virginia is the country's fifth-largest wine-producing state. There are over 25 vineyards in the Monticello Wine Region alone, providing visitors numerous opportunities for wine tours with stops to some of the areas most notable vineyards including: Barboursville, Kluge, White Hall Vineyards, Horton Cellars, Oakencroft Vineyard & Winery and many others.

Other Charlottesville historic sites include the Albemarle County Courthouse, which was built in 1762 and later served as the meeting place of the Virginia legislature as they fled Britain's army in 1781. It

was then that State Legislator Daniel Boone was captured during a surprise British raid on Charlottesville. Robert E. Lee, another wartime hero, is commemorated in Lee Park by a large equestrian stature. Although Historical Downtown Charlottesville is a rich historical showcase, it is also a bustling collection of charming shops, elegant boutiques and many eateries. With numerous fine restaurants and over 115 retail outlets, Charlottesville also offers fine galleries, museums and libraries - all located among 200 historic buildings and landmarks.

KESWICK HALL BREAKS 'TERROIR' FOR ON-SITE VINEYARD

Virginia Wine Country Expands at Keswick Estate

Keswick Hall is thrilled to announce the planting of the hotel's own 200-vine on-site vineyard. Grapes from the Keswick Hall vineyard will be used to produce the property's own private-label wine, while allowing guests an interactive wine country experience.

Under the direction of Keswick's General Manager, Matthias Smith, and Sommelier, Richard Hewitt, the first 200 vines of the new vineyard were planted in May 2010. Extensive soil sampling and analysis have been conducted over the last year in order to confirm that the property grounds are amply suited for growing wine grapes.

For the first planting, Hewitt selected Petit Manseng, a rare grape originally from the Gironde region of Southwestern France. This varietal has the potential to produce a white wine that is intensely flavored with apricot and quince fruit along with spicy and floral notes. The first harvest will occur either in the fall of 2011 or 2012, depending on how well the vines develop in their first year.

The new half-acre vineyard is expected to yield between 100 and 125 cases of this wine and the hotel's staff hopes to expand the vineyard, increasing its yield and number of varietals in the future. Guests will be able to stroll freely throughout the vineyard grounds and may even be able to prune and assist in the tending of the vines.

In 2009, with the help of Virginia Wineworks and an enthusiastic staff, Keswick was able to produce its very own clean, crisp Chardonnay and the more complicated, earthy Petit Verdot – named *Edith's Chardonnay* and *Edith's Petit Verdot* as tribute to Edith Fossett, Thomas Jefferson's chief cook at Monticello. The hotel will continue to produce both of these custom crushes.

GOLF FACTS

Golfers will find a perfect blend of classic and modern play on this course that dates back to 1939, and was redesigned in the early 90's by Arnold Palmer with additional lengthening taking place under Mr. Palmer's direction during the winter of 2002/2003. The lush grounds, old growth trees and shrubs, and sheer beauty will allow one to step back in time while playing on a modern challenging course

- Keswick Club features an 18-hole, 6,506 yard Arnold Palmer Signature golf course, 25-meter lap pool, indoor/outdoor pool, fitness center and spa complete with whirlpool, steam room, hot tub, pro shop, five floodlit tennis courts, and exquisite dining facilities. Adjacent to the club is Keswick Hall, a 48-room luxury country estate hotel with Fossett's (a fine dining restaurant), library, snooker room, lounge and an infinity edge pool overlooking the golf course
- The original golf course was built in 1939 by Fred Findley, a renowned designer of several famous courses in central Virginia.
- The course features mature cedar and maple trees and beautiful redbuds and dogwoods, some dating back 200 years.
- Arnold Palmer completed a redesign of the course in 1992, at which time it was named an Arnold Palmer Signature Golf Course. Palmer said the course had "very good bones" and was, therefore, able to keep the layout of the course, the mature trees and other classic features like the routing plan (or layout of the greens). Palmer's touches included the addition of sandtraps, contour changes, rebuilt greens to meet the United States Golf Association specifications, a new "wall to wall" irrigation system, and cart paths as well as the addition of landscaping were incorporated into the overall design.
- The course layout at Keswick mixes the shotmaking demands of a championship mountainside design with an almost surreal beauty. Unlike beach courses, mountain terrain courses don't need to be long to be challenging. In the mountains the ball kicks and rolls making the "shot value" great.
- Tees and greens: The bent grass greens of Keswick have been described by Arnold Palmer as "the finest in Virginia, probably on the East Coast."
- Current Par: The current par for the course is 71, the course rating is 71.8 and the slope rating is 136. (The national average for slope rating is 115, in theory the higher the number the more difficult the course. The course rating is based on the scratch player and the slope rating is based on the bogey player. Many factors go into determining the course and slope rating including the number of trees and bunkers; number of water hazards; length of course; tightness of landing areas; trouble around the green; elevation changes; etc.)
- Fairways: A consistent plush mix of Bermuda, fescue and rye grasses. It's one of those rare courses where guests can actually play the ball down and never draw a bad lie.

- Roughs: Thick, but not impossibly long and consistent throughout the course.
- Practice Facilities: Feature elevated natural grass tee areas, large target greens, and practice greens.
- Pro-tips for playing Keswick would include:
 - Think strategy on every hole.
 - Concentrate on accurate iron play and cautious putting.
 - Keswick's sloped and undulating greens makes keeping approach shots below the pin an absolute must for scoring.
- Unhurried play and pristine surroundings of this private course make it especially appealing to golfers. Keswick does not have rangers, starters or marshals on course as they believe the game should not be hurried, but instead relaxed so players can enjoy their surroundings and a pressure free game. For guests staying at the Keswick Hall, a temporary club membership is granted for the duration of their stay.
- Since 1993, there have been a total of 19 holes-in-one on the course. On hole three, there have been five holes-in-one; on hole six there have been six; and on hole 11, there have been eight.
- Wildlife is a regular feature of Keswick Hall and on any given day golfers and guests can spot white tail deer, foxes, migrating geese, rabbits and squirrels.
- In addition to the wildlife, a four-legged member of the golf course is Wendy, a frisky and determined Border Collie who has a very important job at Keswick Club. She is the official goose and duck re-locator. True to her inherent nature to herd, Wendy ensures her feathered friends are gently moved off the fairways to the ponds and roughs so that golfers have the right-of-way. Guests can enjoy watching Wendy hard at work from the piazza of the hotel, which overlooks the resorts private 18-hole golf course.

Categories of compliance include environmental planning, wildlife and habitat management, integrated pest management, water conservation, water quality management and outreach and education.
- The course maintains 25 acres of buffer zones in which no fertilizers or pesticides are used around the perimeter of the golf course or natural streams that run through it.
- Little Keswick School is the Outreach and Education Audubon Partner with Keswick Club. One of the projects they completed is the building bird habitats. Golfers can enjoy the creations by this group of girls and boys age seven to 17 on holes two, six, eight and ten.
- For those wanting to work on the psychology of the game, Keswick has a member that can help. Dr. Bob Rotella, a renowned sports psychologist who specializes in the mind-game connection and has coached numerous PGA players, including David Duval, Davis Love, Tom Kite, and Don Pooley is often seen hard at work with one of his clients at Keswick.
- In 1969, Keswick was host to the Virginia State Golf Open.

- In 1999, Keswick was a featured course on the Teardrop Tour.
- UVA Cavalier Classic 1996-1998 featured golf power houses such as “Florida State, North Carolina, Alabama, and LSU.
- 2002 Canadian PGA Tour Lewis Chitengwa Memorial Championship.
- *The Washington Times* rates the course with five flags. Five being the highest rating a course can receive. The ranking is based on several criteria, including: layout, tees and greens, fairways, rough, service, practice facilities, fees/value and overall experience. Keswick is the only five flag experience, other than the Homestead in Virginia.
- Keswick has consistently ranked as one of the best in Great Golf Resorts of the World.
- In 1999, Keswick was selected by Golf Magazine as one of the Top 100 Golf Resorts.
- Celebrities that played the course include Bill Murray, Howard Long, and PGA tour players Hal Sutton, Billy Mayfair, Tom Kite and Aaron Baddeley.
- Hal Sutton and the late Lewis Chitengwa are the official co-course record holders (with a score of 63).
- Golf instruction at Keswick Club focuses on the individual. It is their belief that group instruction is a poor substitute for one on one instruction. In golf, what’s good for one is not necessarily good for all. Golfers come to the lesson tee with different learning styles and problems. Group instruction and any model being used can never address or overcome the many individual needs and problems.
- Broadmoor Lake located adjacent to hole seven, provides a beautiful view for golfers teeing off and a favorite spot for bass fishing. In fact, even celebrity Paul Newman enjoyed a leisurely afternoon of casting here while staying at Keswick Hall.

Led by McGraw or Bubba Pulley, another of Keswick's golf pros, courses will cover basic essentials from how to talk like a golfer ("I'm going to play golf," instead of, "I'm going golfing") to hitting it out of the bunker to picking the right golf ball. Itineraries run from one- to three-day courses and are priced as follows:

- One Day (Start the Journey) - \$215 per person
- Two Day (The Journey Continues) - \$430 per person
- Three Day (Top of the Mountain) - \$645 per person

Keswick Hall's 18-hole course was redesigned by Arnold Palmer in 1990 and has since been named an Arnold Palmer Signature Golf Course.
